Teaching Philosophy

To me, teaching brings the opportunity to share both teaching and learning experiences with my students, and to learn from them in an educational environment. Art education is an opportunity for self-discovery, expression and exploration of talents. As an art teacher, my primary goal is to create a supportive, comfortable and open atmosphere for a wonder-filled experience of self-discovery for my students.

My role is to help students dig deep into themselves to discover their passions and talents, and to set the stage for them to explore their process in creating artwork within specific parameters. I encourage my students to develop a discerning eye for all artwork and to develop an expressive and extensive vocabulary for constructive criticism, both in evaluating their own work and in evaluating others' work. In the on-ground environments, I have critique days where students will present their work and also present critiques to other students' work in a group setting. I always start the critiquing process to model the correct way to present constructive criticism and have had enlightening learning experiences during these critique days, both for my students and for myself. In the online environments, I use multiple technologies to present group critiques asynchronously and try to mirror the on-ground experience for my students.

Teaching Philosophy

I support and guide my students to refine their artwork into finished Portfolio pieces. I also encourage my students to work towards professional presentations, both in their artwork as well as in their communication skills. Cultivating masterfully written and verbal communication skills are essential for students as they work towards the goal of becoming a polished professional artist. One way I incorporate the written communication skills directly into the artwork assignments is by the addition of brief and more extensive artist statements that coordinate with each artwork assignment. These artist statements are continually revised to express the students' thoughts about their own artwork and their process of developing that artwork, and to make sure the statements are correctly and expressively written. I have been involved with WAC (Writing Across the Curriculum) and I always try to incorporate these principles into the written components in my classrooms.

I encourage and share determination and strength in reaching the goals of the coursework, and I am supportive of the goals the students set for themselves. I share my professional knowledge and experiences about the working world that they will eventually enter. I strive to maintain open communication with my students and am there to support them if they want as they continue to grow and move on in their studies and into their careers. My professional contact information has remained the same throughout the years and many former students continue to contact me through the years as they go on in their education and professions.

Focus on Online Teaching

The online environment started out as my secondary teaching environment over a decade ago. It is now my primary teaching environment. I really enjoy the flexibility and unlimited demographic possibilities that online teaching brings. To continue advancing in the area of online instruction, I continually expand my knowledge in emerging technology to further express my student feedback and classroom management capabilities.

My focus for the past few years has been developing extensive yet time efficient methods for markups of student work. I use recorded videos to support written instructions, comments and critiques. I utilize the visual communication of directly marking up student work as feedback for online instruction in an art environment. My markups use the students' own work. I expand on their own elements to flesh out the possibilities of further development in their work and show their original artwork next to the markup with written notes incorporated into the markup.

I have been honored with Excellence in Teaching and Excellence in Student Success awards due to these efforts and results.

Supervisor Philosophy

I have been in supervisory positions since 2006. I have been an Assistant Online Program Director with Art Foundations and Graphic Design Departments, as well as a Lead Faculty with the Art Foundations Department at the Art Institute Online.

I feel that the department is a team, with every position as an integral part of the whole team. I do my very best to quickly and thoroughly complete every task with a positive attitude. I create a comfortable supportive atmosphere for the faculty I work with and I work hard to make sure these faculty are well taken care of so they can concentrate on their teaching jobs and be supportive of their students. I feel that good attitudes are contagious and I do not hesitate to deal with any challenge head on. I thoroughly enjoy working in both faculty and supervisory positions!

Supervisor Duties

I supervised Art Foundations courses and instructors. As part of my supervisory positions, I managed Faculty Meetings, Annual Reviews, Performance Audits, Faculty Coaching and Mentoring, Review of Student Complaints, Curriculum Updates & Revisions for these courses: Drawing, Color Theory, Fundamentals of Design, Perspective Drawing, Visual Indication, Intro to Audio, and Desktop Video. I also managed and supervised all Art Foundations Departmental Faculty Development initiatives including running the Faculty Development Committee and presentations of all Faculty Development Workshops. I functioned as the Subject Matter Expert for creating and implementing faculty training through the Art Foundations Certification Course/Socrates Training. I regularly presented software critiquing workshops as well, specializing in markups in Illustrator and Photoshop.

I use WebEx, Webinar, Dreamweaver, Photoshop, Illustrator, Excel softwares, along with Googledocs, and Dropbox utilities on a daily basis in my work arenas.


Comments from student for Teacher Appreciation Week:





Student markup examples from drawing, perspective and color theory classes.

I think part of the philosophy of us drawing ourselves (and I did tons of these kinds of drawings in art school so I do completely understand) is that our brains "know" our bodies very well~ from the inside out. This connection seeps through our subconscious and into our drawings in an easier way than drawing someone else. It is good to draw both~ ourselves and others- from life. When we draw from photos, camera angles and viewing angles distort perspective and the images tend to flatten. So, there is something to drawing from life and drawing ourselves. Another part of this is the reality of really observing ourselves and trying to shelve the judgment while we simply draw what we see. Left brain/right brain stuff.

Hope this all makes sense. This is definitely where being online versus on-ground is more difficult. Let me know what you think....




Hi Lori,




Fundamentals of Design Final Project: JoLene

My critique for this assignment:

Thanks Rebecca! Your overall design came out well for the concept and audience. The colors and images are gorgeous! There are some things that I would continue to correct to make this a perfect professional final project.

There are typos on pg. 2 (artisti, intresting, actobatic).

On page 1, your dancer's gown blends into the background on the black areas and the "cut lines" around her are very choppy. I'm not sure how you cut her out. If it was in Photoshop, you can soften the edges (feather) so it's not so choppy (see attributes of the selected tools). I might also have put a "glow" around the cut edges to help her pop off the background a bit (especially the black areas).



I think you could have benefited from one more incarnation of your design.


